

## **Of Waterford Interest-** Waterford Township Section Biographies



## Section 21

The center of Waterford Township is the intersection of Highland Road (M-59) and Crescent Lake Road. Section 21 is the southwest corner of this intersection. The business corridor, along Highland Road, is the northern boundary of the section. South of that lies the residential part of Section 21, with Elizabeth Lake Road marking the southern boundary of the section. Running through the center of the section is Pontiac Lake Road, which is where the 1872 plat map shows most of the residences were located. The Clinton River runs diagonally across the township on its way to Pontiac.

Matching residents' names on the 1872 plat map to names in the 1870 census was a little difficult in Section 21. Sometimes, as in the case of J. Utley, the name appears on the plat map, but cannot be found in the 1870 census, or in any census. J. Utley is still unknown. Also unknown is the F. Sutton, found in the southeast corner of the section, with 49 acres along Elizabeth Lake Road and the intersection of Crescent Lake Road. No F. Sutton was found in the 1870 census or agricultural census.

## Elisha Sheldon Mercy Coon

On the 1872 Waterford Township plat map, M. Sheldon owns a farm of 75 acres located in the northeast corner of Section 21. This is the corner of Highland Road (M-59) and Crescent Lake Road, where currently there is a Kroger store. M. Sheldon was not found in the 1870 census for Waterford Township. The 1860 census, page 389, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan, reports a Mercee (sic) Sheldon, age 57, born in New York and her son Edward W., age 21, born in Michigan. The death certificate for Edward W. Sheldon, who died 4 November 1916, Shiawassee County, Michigan, says that his parents were Elisha Sheldon and Mercy Coon. (1)

There is a census entry for E. Sheldon, 1840 census, page 134, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. No further information was found for Elisha Sheldon. He had died before 1850 for his widow, Mercy Sheldon, is found in the

1850 census on page 120, Waterford Township. Recorded with Mercy are her children, Edwin, age 24, Nancy, age 22, Franklin, age 19, all born in New York; and youngest son, Edward, age 12, born in Michigan. Also with the Sheldon family is Hezekiah Coon, age 83, born in Rhode Island. No further information was found for Mercy Sheldon after the 1860 census. In the 1870 census, Edward W. Sheldon is residing with his sister and brother-in-law, Hudson and Nancy Covert, page 589, Waterford Township, so perhaps Mercy was deceased before 1870.

The General Land Office website has a record of Charles Sheldon, of Oakland County, Michigan Territory, purchasing the "East half of the North West Quarter of Section Twenty-one, in Township three North of Range Nine East", 15 October 1835. (2) This is the same property owned by M. Sheldon on the 1872 Waterford Township plat map. Charles Sheldon may be the father of Elisha Sheldon, but research revealed nothing further.

The Hezekiah Coon who resides with Mercy Sheldon in the 1850 census is very likely her father, but, as seemed to be the case with this family, further research could not confirm this. The Oakland County, Michigan Deed Index has a record where Mercy Sheldon, in 1836, is purchasing property from Hezekiah Coon, Deed Book 11, page 252. (3) Unfortunately, Volume 11 has not yet been digitized by the Family History Library. In October 1835, Hezekiah Coon of Orleans County, New York is purchasing two pieces of land located in Sections 17 and 20 of Waterford Township. (2) No further information could be found about Hezekiah Coon.

- New Tutorial for Web Based Indexing FamilySearch has streamlined indexing into a web based portal. This video will demonstrate how to find the Michigan Naturalization Project and index with this new tool.
- By request-where to find "out of copyright" books online
  - <u>HathiTrust</u> is a partnership of academic & research institutions, offering a collection of millions of titles digitized from libraries around the world.
  - Internet Archive found at <u>Archive.org</u>. They pay special attention to books. Not everyone has access to a public or academic library with a good collection, so to provide universal access we need to provide digital versions of books. We began a program to digitize books in 2005 and today we scan 1,000 books per day in 28 locations around the world. Books published prior to 1923 are available for download, and hundreds of thousands of <u>modern books can be</u> <u>borrowed</u> through our <u>Open Library</u> site. Some of our digitized books are only available to the <u>print disabled</u>.
  - <u>Google Books</u> is a service from Google Inc. that searches the full text of books and magazines that Google has scanned, converted to text using optical character recognition, and stored in its digital database.
  - FamilySearch has a free virtual online library of rare historic books from all over the world to help you discover rich, unknown details about the lives of your ancestors. A dynamic, priceless online repository of some of the greatest hidden historic treasures. International, and a growing host of partnering libraries and organizations and volunteers, have announced that they've reached the milestone of publishing 200,000 historic volumes online for free at <u>books.FamilySearch.org</u>. The growing online collection, which began in 2007, is invaluable to genealogists and family historians in finding their ancestors.


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## Section 21

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Matching residents' names on the 1872 plat map to names in the 1870 census was a little difficult in Section 21. Sometimes, as in the case of J. Utley, the name appears on the plat map, but cannot be found in the 1870 census, or in any census. J. Utley is still unknown. Also unknown is the F. Sutton, found in the southeast corner of the section, with 49 acres along Elizabeth Lake Road and the intersection of Crescent Lake Road. No F. Sutton was found in the 1870 census or agricultural census.

## **James Cassidy**

In the northeast corner of Section 21 is a black square with the name "Cassidy" and "5 a" in small letters. The five acres of land, now the southwest corner of the intersection of Highland and Crescent Lake Roads, was owned by James Cassidy. The 1870 census shows James Cassidy, age 27, born in New York; Rosana Cassidy, age 61, born in Ireland; and Anna Cassidy, age 25, a dress-maker, born in Michigan.

The Cassidy family left few records for the genealogist to find. James Cassidy appears in the 1850 census with his parents, James and Rosina Casedy (sic), on page 348, Brandon Township, Oakland County, Michigan. (1) The father, James Cassidy, is age 45, born in Ireland; Rosina, age 44, also born in Ireland. Children are Edward, age 21, born in England; James Jr., age 16 and Mary A., age 14, both born in New York; Rosina, age 11, and Elizabeth, age 8, both born in Michigan. At age eleven, Rosina would have been born about 1839, so the family arrived in Michigan about then.

The 1860 census was too faint to read. The transcription lists R. Cassiday as head of the household. The Cassidy family still resided in Brandon Township. The senior James Cassidy had died before 1860. This family had no cemetery records found online. The Oakland County Deed Index, Volume 5, shows that Rosannah Cassedy, in 1867, is selling 165 acres, located in Section 24, Township 3N Range 8E (White Lake). (3) That same year James B. Cassedy, is purchasing property located in Section 21, Township 3N Range 9E (Waterford). (3)

James Cassidy and his mother, Rosanna, did not reside long in Waterford Township. The 1880 census shows them living on School Street in Pontiac, Michigan. (4) James' occupation is listed as retired and he is only 35 years old. Rosanna's death is unknown. James Cassidy died of typhoid fever, 24 October 1903, in Pontiac, Michigan. (5) He never married.



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

## **Of Waterford Interest-** Waterford Township Section Biographies



## Section 21

The center of Waterford Township is the intersection of Highland Road (M-59) and Crescent Lake Road. Section 21 is the southwest corner of this intersection. The business corridor, along Highland Road, is the northern boundary of the section. South of that lies the residential part of Section 21, with Elizabeth Lake Road marking the southern boundary of the section. Running through the center of the section is Pontiac Lake Road, which is where the 1872 plat map shows most of the residences were located. The Clinton River runs diagonally across the township on its way to Pontiac.

Matching residents' names on the 1872 plat map to names in the 1870 census was a little difficult in Section 21. Sometimes, as in the case of J. Utley, the name appears on the plat map, but cannot be found in the 1870 census, or in any census. J. Utley is still unknown. Also unknown is the F. Sutton, found in the southeast corner of the section, with 49 acres along Elizabeth Lake Road and the intersection of Crescent Lake Road. No F. Sutton was found in the 1870 census or agricultural census.

## Morgan R. Wormer Henrietta Emerson

The Wormer family is found in the 1870 census, on page 593, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. Head of the family is Morgan Wormer, age 42, born in New York; his wife Henrietta, age 41, born in New York, daughter Ida, age 15, born in New York; and son Edwin, age 4, born in Michigan. Residing with the family are Henrietta's parents, (2) Henry Emerson, age 66, born in Vermont and Marietta Emerson, age 65, born in New York. The eighty acre farm of M.R. Wormer was located in the southwestern corner of Section 21, with Pontiac Lake Road on the north side, Elizabeth Lake Road on the south, and Airport Road on the west.

Morgan R. Wormer, or possibly Van Wormer, was born about 1827, in New York. (1) His parents are unknown. Morgan married, 11 June 1851, Henrietta Emerson. (2) He died 24 October 1889 in Walker County, Georgia. (2) Henrietta Emerson was the daughter of Henry Emerson and Marietta Webster, born 30 January 1829, Rodman, Jefferson County, New York (2) and died in 1904. (3)

The Wormer's lived a nomadic life and are found in Waterford Township only in the 1870 census. In the 1860 census, Morgan and Henrietta Wormer are residents of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. (1) Morgan's occupation is given as "steward on steam boat". Ancestry's IRS Tax Assessment Lists, 1862-1918, records Morgan R. Wormer, 1866, living in Holly, Michigan. This time Morgan's occupation is "Keeper of Eating House, Retail Liquor Dealer". (4) Does this mean he was a saloon keeper?! In the 1880 census, Morgan and Henrietta Wormer are residents of Walker County, Georgia, just a little south of Chattanooga, Tennessee. (5) The widow Henrietta Wormer is found in a 1894 Chattanooga City Directory (6) and in 1898 she is in a Seattle, Washington City Directory. (7) The 1900 census finds Henrietta Wormer living in Los Angeles, California. (8)

Henrietta (Emerson) Wormer and her father, Henry, are descendants of Thomas Emerson, an early settler of Ipswich, Massachusetts. (2) Joseph Emerson, son of Thomas, and Henrietta's ancestor, married Elizabeth Bulkeley. Elizabeth Bulkeley was the daughter of Rev. Peter Bulkeley, first minister of Concord, Massachusetts, and a Gateway Ancestor with family ties to kings of England. (9)



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## Susan Hayward Welcome Hill

The 1872 plat map of Waterford Township shows the eighty acre farm of Mrs. S. Hill in the south part of Section 21. The southern boundary of the farm is Elizabeth Lake Road and the residence is found in the northern part of the property on Pontiac Lake Road. In the 1870 census, Susan Hill is found on page 593, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. The census entry reports that residing in the household are Susan Hill, age 54, born in Massachusetts; Nelson J., age 38; and Caroline, age 37, both born in New York. Also residing in the Hill household are Leander Birdsall, age 25; his wife, Frances E., age 25, both born in New York; and children,

Ida O., age 2, born in New York; and Julia, age six months, born December, in Michigan. Research will show that Frances Ellen Birdsall was a daughter of Welcome and Susan Hill. (1)

Susan Hayward was born 6 January 1806, in Pelham, Massachusetts, the daughter of Ichabod and Ruth (Hackett) Hayward. (2) She married Welcome Hill, probably in New York since all the Hill children were born there. (1) The Find A Grave entry for Welcome Hill says he was born 23 January 1797, in Rhode Island. (3) But the tombstone picture included with the Find A Grave entry, is not legible and there is no birth record for Welcome Hill in the Rhode Island Vital Records, so this date cannot be confirmed. Welcome Hill died 10 May 1852, in Wayne County, New York. (3) He is buried in the Palmyra Cemetery, Palmyra, New York. (3)

The Hill family is still residing in the Town of Macedon, Wayne County, New York for the 1860 census. (4) In 1869 S. and C.A. Hill are purchasing land in the East ½ of the Southwest ¼ of Section 21, Township 3N, Range 9N (Waterford). (5) Susan Hill died in Waterford Township, in 1874, and she is buried in the Waterford Center Cemetery.(6) Through her mother's Hackett family line, Susan is a descendant of John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley of the Mayflower. (7)



## **Of Waterford Interest-** Waterford Township Section Biographies



## Section 21

The center of Waterford Township is the intersection of Highland Road (M-59) and Crescent Lake Road. Section 21 is the southwest corner of this intersection. The business corridor, along Highland Road, is the northern boundary of the section. South of that lies the residential part of Section 21, with Elizabeth Lake Road marking the southern boundary of the section. Running through the center of the section is Pontiac Lake Road, which is where the 1872 plat map shows most of the residences were located. The Clinton River runs diagonally across the township on its way to Pontiac.

Matching residents' names on the 1872 plat map to names in the 1870 census was a little difficult in Section 21. Sometimes, as in the case of J. Utley, the name appears on the plat map, but cannot be found in the 1870 census, or in any census. J. Utley is still unknown. Also unknown is the F. Sutton, found in the southeast corner of the section, with 49 acres along Elizabeth Lake Road and the intersection of Crescent Lake Road. No F. Sutton was found in the 1870 census or agricultural census.

## Benjamin Franklin Elwood Harriet Emily Moore

The 1870 census for Waterford Township, Oakland County reports on page 593 the household of F. B. Elwood, age 32, born in Michigan; wife Harriet, age 23, born in Michigan; and daughter Lucy, age 1, born in Michigan. Residing with the Elwood family are Adrian Ostrander, age 17, farm laborer, born in New York, and Harriet Briggs, age 17, domestic servant, born in Michigan. The census says that F. B. Elwood has \$5,000 in real estate, while the 1870 Agricultural Census reports that F. B. Elwood owns 74 acres. The 1870 census does record Benjamin Franklin Elwood as F. B. Elwood.

There is no B. F. Elwood, who owned property in Section 21, on the 1872 plat map of Waterford Township. By following the 1870 census taker's route, comparing the surnames with the 1872 plat map, it appears that the census taker traveled west on Pontiac Lake Road from Crescent Lake Road to Airport Road. This places B. F. Elwood on the 75 acre property owned by Mercy Sheldon. In 1868, Benjamin F. Elwood is purchasing part of the NE ¼ of Section 21, Township 3, Range 9 (Waterford) (1) and in 1871, he is selling this same land to Morris Sheldon. (2) Perhaps Morris Sheldon is really Mercy Sheldon?

Benjamin Franklin Elwood was born 1 December 1837, in Royal Oak, Oakland County, Michigan. (3)(4) He was the son of Daniel Elwood and Fanny Clark. (4) The Elwood and Clark families were reported under Benjamin's brother, Solomon Clark Elwood, Section 18. Benjamin F. Elwood died 15 May 1902, in Pontiac, Michigan. (3)(4) He is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac.(3) Benjamin was married twice. His first wife was Louisa D. Rundel, married 5 December 1861, in Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan. (6) Louisa died 21 June 1866, in Oakland County, Michigan and is buried in the North Farmington Cemetery, Farmington Hills, Michigan. (7) There seems to have been no surviving children from this marriage.

Benjamin married secondly, Harriet Emily Moore, 4 July 1867, in Pontiac, Michigan.(15) Harriet was born 10 December 1847. Some records report that Harriet was born in Fairport, Monroe County, New York. (3)(9) But her family was in Commerce Township, Oakland County, Michigan for the 1840 census. After the death of Benjamin in 1902, Harriet married secondly, Erastus Horton, 3 July 1916, in Oakland County, Michigan. (10) Harriet died 7 January 1929, in Detroit, Michigan. (9) She is buried with Benjamin, under the name of Elwood, in Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (3) Harriet's death certificate is under the name of Harriett E. Harbow, with "(Horton)" following her name.

Harriet Emily Moore was the daughter of Charles T. Moore and Mabel Heath. (12) Charles T. Moore died 11 October 1857, in Milford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. (12) Harriet was a minor aged child at the time of his death and it is her guardianship papers that proved her father's name. (12) Mabel Heath was the daughter of Joseph Heath and Sarah Luce. (13) She died 28 August 1853, in Oakland County, Michigan and is buried in the Wixom Cemetery, Wixom, Oakland County, Michigan. (14) Mabel was the sister of Harriet Heath, wife of Carlos B. Plumb, who resided in Section 17 of Waterford Township. Further information about the Heath and Luce families is found under Carlos B. Plumb, Section 17.

Incredibly, there are family trees found online that claim Mabel (Heath) Moore, who died 28 August 1853, was married to Charles Frederick Moore, 4 February 1903, in Newark, New Jersey, and had two more children. The fact that Mable Heath was married fifty years after her death is a feat worthy of mention in the Guinness Book of World Records.

<u>The DNAgedcom Client</u> offers the Collins' Leeds Method 3D. The DNAgedcom Client costs \$5/month. During the month, you can run as many reports as you want.

Note: <u>GEDmatch Genesis</u>, (must register for an account) now allows a cluster report as part of a Tier 1 (\$10 per month) donation. A cluster report groups your individual matches together as they relate to each other – for example, if your mother's nephews, cousins and aunts all tested, they'll be in one colored group, while your father's maternal family will be in a different colored group and his paternal family in a different colored group. Since extended family members will still share a small amount of common DNA between them, this is a good way to categorize people on your match list quickly.



### Section 21

The center of Waterford Township is the intersection of Highland Road (M-59) and Crescent Lake Road. Section 21 is the southwest corner of this intersection. The business corridor, along Highland Road, is the northern boundary of the section. South of that lies the residential part of Section 21, with Elizabeth Lake Road marking the southern boundary of the section. Running through the center of the section is Pontiac Lake Road, which is where the 1872 plat map shows most of the residences were located. The Clinton River runs diagonally across the township on its way to Pontiac.

Matching residents' names on the 1872 plat map to names in the 1870 census was a little difficult in Section 21. Sometimes, as in the case of J. Utley, the name appears on the plat map, but cannot be found in the 1870 census, or in any census. J. Utley is still unknown. Also unknown is the F. Sutton, found in the southeast corner of the section, with 49 acres along Elizabeth Lake Road and the intersection of Crescent Lake Road. No F. Sutton was found in the 1870 census or agricultural census.

#### This is the last submission for Section 21, next will be Section 28

Winton J. Plumb Martha Vliet

The 111 acre property of W. Plumb was located in the southeast quarter of Section 21. The residence is shown in the northern part of the property, along Pontiac Lake Road. The southern boundary was Elizabeth Lake Road and the northern shore of Crescent Lake. The 1870 census, page 593, Waterford Township, has Winton Plumb, age 25, born in New York and his wife, Mattie, age 23, born in Michigan. Also with the Plumbs are Ettie Cofinger, age 18, domestic servant, born in Michigan, and John Hendrie, age 20, farm laborer, born in Michigan.

Winton J. Plumb was born about 1844, in New York, the son of Carlos B. Plumb and Harriet Heath. (1) He married Martha Vliet, 13 December 1869, in Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan. (2) The Plumbs were newlyweds in the 1870 census. Winton died of typhoid fever, 14 August 1880, in Waterford Township. (3) The Plumb and Heath families were reported under Winton's parents, Carlos and Harriet (Heath) Plumb, who resided in Section 17, Waterford Township.

Martha, aka Mattie, Vliet was born 15 December 1846, in Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan. (4)(5) She was the daughter of William Van Buskirk Vliet and Martha Ann Axford. (4) Mattie never remarried after the death of her husband, Winton Plumb. She died in Clarkston, Michigan on 27 February 1933 and is buried in the Lakeview Cemetery, Clarkston. (4)(5)

General Land Office records show that William V. Vliet, of Oakland County, Michigan, was purchasing land in Independence Township in 1837. The Vliet family was originally from New Jersey. William Van Buskirk Vliet was born 21 November 1797, in Warren County, New Jersey. (5) He married Martha Ann Axford, 1 July 1821, Sussex County, New Jersey. (6)(7) William V. Vliet died 18 January 1880, in Oakland County. Martha died 17 October 1881, also in Oakland County. (5) Both are buried in the Lakeview Cemetery, Clarkston, Michigan. (5)

During the War of 1812, William V. Vliet served from New Jersey, with the rank of Captain. (8) His father, William Vliet, fought in the Revolutionary War.(9) The parents of Martha Ann Axford were John Axford and

Eleanor Polhemus. (7) Eleanor Polhemus was the daughter of Major John Polhemus and Susannah Hart. (7) Major Polhemus was with George Washington at Valley Forge, the Battle of Trenton, Battle of Monmouth, and the Battle of Brandywine. (10) Susannah Hart was the daughter of John Hart, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and his wife, Deborah Scudder. (11)

# Section 28

Today Section 28 is mostly residential with a handful of small businesses along the northern boundary on Elizabeth Lake Road. Most of the eastern portion of the section is occupied by part of Crescent Lake and the western end of Elizabeth Lake. There are many homes on the shores of both lakes. The Clinton River meanders along the western side of Section 28 on its way to Pontiac. On the 1872 plat map of Section 28 there were only five land owners and one, H.W. Lord, was an absentee owner. Henry W. Lord was a resident of West Bloomfield Township. He also owned land in Section 19 and was reported in that section's biographies.

# David Leland Gitty Stottle

The 1872 plat map of Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan shows, in Section 28, the 160 acre property of D. Leland along the western side of the section. The farm stretches from the section's northern boundary on Elizabeth Lake Road to the southern boundary shared with Section 33. The Clinton River flows south through the whole farm and the still existing residence, is shown as being located on Elizabeth Lake Road, just east of where the road crosses the river. The 1870 census for Waterford Township, page 590, has David Leland, age 55, born in England; his wife, Gertrude, age 63, born in New York; two children, William, age 24, and Sarah, age 21, both born in Michigan; and James Chapman, age 12, born in Michigan, who works on the farm.

If David Leland's age at death is correct, he was born 19 August 1814, in England. (1) David died 5 April 1886, aged 71 years, 7 months, and 17 days, in Waterford Township, (1) and is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (2) The website, Find A Grave, says that David Leland died on 6 April 1886, but there is no picture of David's headstone to prove this claim. (2) Online research did not find the names of David Leland's parents.

An Oakland County history contains a biography of William Leland, son of David and Gitty. William claims that his father arrived in the United States in 1840 and "immediately" came to Michigan. In 1845 David returned east to Monroe County, New York, where he married Gitty Stottle on 20 August 1845. (3) The researcher has to wonder, if David came "immediately" to Michigan in 1840, how did he meet Gitty Stottle in Monroe County, New York? Whatever the circumstances, David Leland did marry Gitty Stottle, daughter of Peter and Margaret Stottle. (4) On 5 April 1846, David and Gitty are purchasing land in Section 28, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. (5) The Leland family is recorded in the 1850 census on page 119, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. (6)

Gitty (Stottle) Leland, died 15 May 1881, in Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan, and is recorded in Oakland County death records under the name of Katy Luland. (7) If her age at death, 75 years, 9 months, and 13 days, is correct, then she was born 2 August 1805. (7) In the censuses she is always reported to have been born in New York and the 1870 census is the only one to record her name as Gertrude. Gitty Leland is buried with her husband in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (2)

The parents of Gitty (Stottle) Leland were Peter and Margaret Stottle of Chili, Monroe County, New York. (4) Peter died 28 June 1824 and Margaret died 20 March 1863, both died in Monroe County and they are buried in the Fellows Cemetery, South Chili, Monroe County, New York. (8) Nothing further is known about Peter and Margaret Stottle.

Topic: Burned-over District: As most local historians know, the majority of people who came to Michigan (and certainly Oakland County) in the territorial and early statehood periods were from western New York. What is less well known is that this area of New York is often referred to by historians as the Burned-over District.

Western New York in the 1820's experienced an especially intense phase of the religious movement that swept through the United States in the first half of the 19th Century known as the Second Great Awakening. In addition to the religious enthusiasm that developed here, that same religious excitement served as fertile ground for the launching and spread of social and political reforms that were a feature of ante-bellum America. Temperance, abolition, dietary reform, public schools, prison reform, women's rights, etc., were all movements that were over represented, and in some cases begun, in the Burned-over District.

For our purposes, the important thing to note is that the people who settled Michigan came from this religious and reformist hot-house. Michigan in the years before the Civil War was, to a large extent, a colony of the Burned-over District and it is difficult to fully understand early Michigan without some appreciation of the unique character

and influence of western New York...a region that had been burned-over with religious and, as a consequence, reformist zeal.

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# Joseph Elliott Taylor Caroline Eliza Bradt

The 1870 census, page 590, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan, records Elliott J. Taylor, age 41, born in New York. With him is his wife, Carrie E., age 30, born in New York; son, William B, age 11, born in Michigan; Stanley E. Smith, age 53, born in New York, no occupation is given; and Andrew Gibson, age 22, farm laborer, born in Ireland. On the 1872 plat map of Waterford Township, the farm of J.E. Taylor is located on Elizabeth Lake Road, and on the western shore of Crescent Lake.

Joseph Elliott Taylor was born 20 June 1829, in Saratoga County, New York, the son of William Taylor and Lucy Harger. (1)(2) He married Caroline Eliza Bradt (3) and moved to Waterford Township, Oakland County, in 1850. (3)(4) Joseph died 3 September 1874 and is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan.

The Taylor family first settled in Middletown, Monmouth County, New Jersey during the 1690's. (7) Judge John Taylor, and his wife, Chloe Cox, grandparents of Joseph E. Taylor, moved to Charlton, Saratoga County, New York, in 1774. (2)(7) William Taylor, son of Judge John, and father of Joseph, was born in Saratoga County on 7 May 1779 and died 24 September 1836, also in Saratoga County. (2)(8) Lucy Harger, mother of Joseph Taylor died 16 January 1866 and is buried with her husband in the Pine Grove Cemetery, Charlton, Saratoga County, New York. (8)

Caroline Eliza Bradt was the daughter of Garrett and Jane (Van Epp) Bradt. (3)(9)(12) She was born 4 November 1830 in Glenville, Schenectady County, New York. (9)(10) After the death of Joseph, Caroline married secondly, Eleazer Stanley Smith, 21 February 1877, in Waterford Township. (10) This is the same person as Stanley E. Smith who is recorded with the Taylor family in the 1870 census. E. Stanley Smith died 19 March 1890, in Waterford, and is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (10)(11) Caroline Smith died 2 December 1905, Waterford Township and is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (6)(9)

The bulk of these materials span a period of roughly two hundred years, from 1650 to 1850. However, these dates are not entirely inclusive. For example, the collections contain essays written about Michigan's ancient burial mounds as well as documents from the civil war era. It is also important to note that while most of the MPHC concerns the events and people of Michigan's past, materials pertaining to other parts of the mid-west are included as well. A research guide is available through MSU Library. Note that many these volumes may also be accessed through HathiTrust.org, archive.org, and local libraries. The Allen County Public Library has an index volume created to assist in finding different subjects and people mentioned: Classified Finding List of the Collections of the Michigan Pioneer and Historical Society, published in 1952.

#### Date: September 18, 2019

Topic: **Burned-over District:** As most local historians know, the majority of people who came to Michigan (and certainly Oakland County) in the territorial and early statehood periods were from western New York. What is less well known is that this area of New York is often referred to by historians as the Burned-over District.

Western New York in the 1820's experienced an especially intense phase of the religious movement that swept through the United States in the first half of the 19th Century known as the Second Great Awakening. In addition to the religious enthusiasm that developed here, that same religious excitement served as fertile ground for the launching and spread of social and political reforms that were a feature of ante-bellum America. Temperance, abolition, dietary reform, public schools, prison reform, women's rights, etc., were all movements that were over represented, and in some cases begun, in the Burned-over District.

For our purposes, the important thing to note is that the people who settled Michigan came from this religious and reformist hot-house. Michigan in the years before the Civil War was, to a large extent, a colony of the Burned-over District and it is difficult to fully understand early Michigan without some appreciation of the unique character and influence of western New York...a region that had been burned-over with religious and, as a consequence, reformist zeal. # Of Waterford Interest- Waterford Township Section Biographies



# Section 28

Today Section 28 is mostly residential with a handful of small businesses along the northern boundary on Elizabeth Lake Road. Most of the eastern portion of the section is occupied by part of Crescent Lake and the western end of Elizabeth Lake. There are many homes on the shores of both lakes. The Clinton River meanders along the western side of Section 28 on its way to Pontiac. On the 1872 plat map of Section 28 there were only five land owners and one, H.W. Lord, was an absentee owner. Henry W. Lord was a resident of West Bloomfield Township. He also owned land in Section 19 and was reported in that section's biographies.

Alonzo D. Baker Sarah E. Opdyke The 80 acre farm of A.D. Baker was located on the land between Crescent Lake and Elizabeth Lake. On the 1872 plat map of Waterford Township the Baker residence is located on Cooley Lake Road, across the road from the north shore of Elizabeth Lake. Alonzo Baker is reported in the 1870 census, age 48, born in New York. Also in the household is his wife, Sally E., age 37, born in New Jersey, and Dolly, age 6, born in Michigan.

Alonzo D. Baker was born in 1822, Cortland County, New York, (1)(3) the son of Kasson Baker (2) and his first wife, Lucy Coburn. (4) He married Sarah E. Opdyke, (6)(7) 1855-1860, probably in Niagara County, New York since both Alonzo and Sarah were residents of that place in the 1855 New York State Census. (3) The Baker's were still residents of Lockport in the 1860 census. (5) Their daughter, Dolly, was born about 1864, in Michigan, so the Baker's had moved to Michigan sometime between 1860 and 1864. Alonzo Baker died 21 December 1899, in Waterford, Oakland County, Michigan. (2) He is buried in the Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (1) Alonzo's entry on the website, Find A Grave, reports that he died on 24 December (1), but Alonzo's death certificate says 21 December. (2) The death certificate says Alonzo's cause of death was "Burnt to Death". The story was found in the Bay City Times, Bay City, Michigan. Alonzo was burning marsh land on his farm, and was watching the fire to make sure his fences did not burn. Later that day he was found "burned almost beyond recognition". It was speculated that he may have been overcome by the smoke and heat and lost consciousness. (8)

The Baker family can be traced back to Rev. Nicholas Baker who settled in Hingham, Massachusetts in 1635. (9) Alonzo's father, Kasson Baker, was the son of Elijah Baker and Olive Kasson from Windham County, Connecticut. (9) Elijah Baker was a veteran of the Revolutionary War, serving from Windham County. Both Elijah and Olive received pensions for his service. (11)

Sarah E. Opdyke, also known as Sally, was the daughter of Albert Opdyke and Sarah Case of Hunterdon County, New Jersey and later from Berwick, Columbia County, Pennsylvania. (7)(12)(13) She was born 19 August 1834, in New Jersey. (7)(12) The death certificate for Mrs. Sally Baker says she died 20 August 1909 in Pontiac, Michigan. (12) She is buried with her husband in Oak Hill Cemetery, Ponitac. (1) The Opdyke family can be traced back to Louris Jansen op Dyke who sailed from the Netherlands and settled in Gravesend, Long Island in 1655. (7) Sarah's great-grandfather was Albert Opdyke of Hunterdon County, New Jersey. He was a Captain in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Regiment of Hunterdon Militia during the Revolutionary War.





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Josiah C. Gaylord Matilda A. Seeley

The 1870 census, page 590, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan lists Josiah C. Gaylord, age 52, born in New York; wife Matilda, age 53, born in New York; Ella, age 22, Carrie, age 17, both born in Michigan; and Amos Gaylord, age 82, born in Connecticut. On the 1872 plat map of Waterford Township, the property of J.C. Gaylord is found in the southern part of Section 28, where Cooley Lake Road runs along the shores of Elizabeth Lake.

Josiah C. Gaylord was the son of Amos and Sarah (Chapman) Gaylord, (1) born 20 July 1817, in Yates County, New York, and died 20 March 1897, in Pontiac, Michigan. (1)(2) He is buried in Oak Hill Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (2) Josiah married Matilda Seeley,(3) but no marriage date has been found, and it is very probable that the marriage took place in New York. J.C. and Matilda Gaylord are found in the 1850 census on page 117, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. (4) Their oldest child, Sarah, is four years old and born in Michigan, so the Gaylord's had arrived in Michigan about 1846. (4)

The Amos Gaylord who is reported with Josiah in the 1870 census is his father.(1) Amos is reported in the 1860 census, with William P. Gaylord, page 495, Town of Torrey, Yates County, New York. He is not with William P. Gaylord in the 1865 New York State Census, so Amos may have moved to Waterford Township between 1860-1865. Amos Gaylord was born 11 August 1787, in Hartford County, Connecticut, the son of John Gaylord and Charlotte Hitchcock. (5) Amos married Sarah Chapman, born 24 June 1795 and died in 1859, Yates County, New York. (6) After his death on 8 November 1872, in Waterford Township, Amos Gaylord's remains were shipped to Yates County, New York, where he is buried with his wife in the Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Torrey, New York. (6)(7)(8) Amos' father, John Gaylord, was a veteran of the Revolutionary War, serving from Connecticut. (5) The Gaylord family can be traced back to William Gaylord who settled first in Dorchester, Massachusetts in 1630 and then moved to Windsor, Connecticut in 1638. (9)(10)



## Of Waterford Interest- Waterford Township Section Biographies

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# Section 29

Section 29 is bounded on the west side by Hospital Road and on the north by Elizabeth Lake Road. The Clinton River flows along the east side of the section. Lockhaven Road curves its way roughly through the center of the section. Much of the section is still undeveloped with residential space found along the three main roads.

This section was a little different from the other sections previously reported on. Much of the land consisted of small twenty or forty acre plots whose owners did not reside on that property and most of them have been featured in other section biographies. They are:

- Jacob Terry of Section 19
- Joseph W. Chapman of Section 20
- Morgan R. Wormer of Section 21
- Calvin Rose of Section 21
- James Greer of West Bloomfield Township
- Erastus Herrington of Section 32
- Jacob Rowland of Section 20

Not included in Section 29's biographies will be James Greer who had a fifteen acre piece of property and resided in West Bloomfield Township. Erastus Herrington will be included in the biographies of Section 32.

### Joseph A. Briggs Rachel Ann Smith

The 1872 Waterford Township plat map shows the 40 acre farm of J.A. Briggs in the northwestern corner of Section 29, formed by Elizabeth Lake Road and Hospital Road. On the 1870 census, page 591, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan, the Briggs household has Joseph A. Briggs, age 52, born in New York; Rachel A., age 41, born in New York; and their children, Oscar E., age 22, Harriet, age 17, George, age 16, Elsie, age 14, Clara, age 8, and Anna, age 3, all born in Michigan.

Not much information about Joseph Briggs was available using online resources. The best source of information was Joseph's death record. He died on 3 April 1895, Waterford Township, Oakland County, in the Oakland County Poor House. (1) The death record says Joseph was 78 years, 3 months, and 2 days and, if correct, that calculates to a birth date of 1 January 1817. (1) Joseph was born in New York and his father was Joseph H. Briggs. (1) No cemetery record was found.

Joseph Briggs married Rachel Ann Smith, 18 February 1847, Sterling, Macomb County, Michigan. (2) The Briggs family are residents of Waterford Township in the 1850 census and remained in Waterford Township for the rest of their lives.

The death records for Oakland County was also the best source of information about Rachel (Smith) Briggs. She died of tuberculosis, shortly after Joseph's death, on 20 June 1895 in the Oakland County Poor House, Waterford Township. (1) If her age at death of 66 years 7 months and 19 days is correct, then Rachel was born 1 November 1828. (1) No cemetery record has been found, but Rachel's obituary says that the funeral will be held at the Waterford Center school house, which is across the road from the Waterford Center Cemetery. (3) Joseph and Rachel's son, Oscar, is buried in the Waterford Center Cemetery, perhaps his parents are also buried there but with no headstones.

The parents of Joseph Briggs could not be found. Rachel's death record says her parents are R.D. and H.E. Smith. (1) The 1850 census reports a Robert D. and Harriet Smith, both born in Canada, are residents of Sterling Township, Macomb County, Michigan. (4) On 1 May 1838, Robert D. Smith, of Wayne County, Michigan, was purchasing land in Macomb County. (5) The Smith family is recorded in the 1840 census as residents of Warren Township, Macomb County, Michigan. Nothing further is known about the family of Rachel Smith.

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# Section 29

Section 29 is bounded on the west side by Hospital Road and on the north by Elizabeth Lake Road. The Clinton River flows along the east side of the section. Lockhaven Road curves its way roughly through the center of the section. Much of the section is still undeveloped with residential space found along the three main roads.

This section was a little different from the other sections previously reported on. Much of the land consisted of small twenty or forty acre plots whose owners did not reside on that property and most of them have been featured in other section biographies. They are:

- Jacob Terry of Section 19
- Joseph W. Chapman of Section 20
- Morgan R. Wormer of Section 21
- Calvin Rose of Section 21
- James Greer of West Bloomfield Township
- Erastus Herrington of Section 32
- Jacob Rowland of Section 20

Not included in Section 29's biographies will be James Greer who had a fifteen acre piece of property and resided in West Bloomfield Township. Erastus Herrington will be included in the biographies of Section 32.

### John E. Spies Mary A. Roll

The 1870 census records the John Spies family on page 592, Waterford Township, Oakland County, Michigan. The 1870 household was John Spies, age 42, born in Switzerland; his wife, Mary A, age 42, born in France; and children, Emma, age 17, Mary, age 15, Charley, age 13, John, age 11, Anna, age 9, Jule, age 7 (female in 1870, Julius, male, age 16 in 1880), Lucy, age 5, and Albert age 1, all born in Michigan. The Spies property was the largest farm in Section 29, located on the southern boundary of the section, across both sides of Lockhaven Road.

John Spies was born 9 January 1827 in Switzerland, the son of Michael Spies. (1) He married Mary Ann Roll in Switzerland and their first two children were born there. (1)(3) According to the 1900 census, the Spies family immigrated to the United States in 1845. (2) They were not found in the 1850 census. In 1853 John Spies is purchasing land in Independence Township, Oakland County, (4) and the family is residing there for the 1860 census. (3) By the time of the 1870 census John Spies and family are residents of Waterford Township.

The death certificate of Mary Ann Spies says she was born in 1828 and died 19 May 1901, age 73, in Pontiac, Michigan. (1) Her entry found on the website, Find A Grave, says she died 19 May 1909, aged 81. (5) However, the headstone picture clearly says 1828-1901 and the death certificate says age 73. John died 21 October 1917,

in Pontiac, Michigan. (1) Both John and Mary Ann Spies are buried in the Mount Hope Cemetery, Pontiac, Michigan. (5)

### PERSI Search Tip - Use State Postal Codes

Have you ever done a surname search on PERSI? Maybe you haven't been able to find anything when you put in a last name and a place. The problem with doing this is that most surname articles were not indexed with places attached. Instead, the indexers used state postal codes in the title to indicate where the subject of the article lived. My big tip is to use the two-letter state postal codes in the keyword or "what else" search box when searching PERSI on FindMyPast. Read more here: How to Search PERSI with State Postal Codes
